Coin in the Spotlight: 1880 Shield Nickel

For the Shield nickel, after two proof-only years (1877 and 1878) and 1879 mintage of less than 26,000, the year 1880 saw the fewest nickels ever coined for circulation, with a paltry 16,000 minted. This key date is by far the rarest nickel struck for circulation, and one of those dates where proofs are *much* more available than business strikes. Almost 4,000 proofs were struck that year, and are easily obtainable.

One of the challenges for the 1880 nickel is that many of the proofs were a bit dull, and quite a few of them were spent and are found circulated, where they can be hard to distinguish from the actual business strikes.

Study of the dies indicate that the reverse die of the 1880 circulation strike had a gouge on it, and all coins struck from it have a raised mound below the right side of the second T in STATES. Visible in the photo at right

as a raised white spot, this small mound is what the third-party grading services use for attribution. Without that mound, PCGS and NGC will call the coin a proof, even if well circulated. This difference is critical, as a Proof-65 is worth just \$600 while an XF circulation strike is worth a whopping \$5,500!!
