Coin in the Spotlight: 1898-S Barber Quarter

The San Francisco issue of the Barber quarter from 1898 is a most interesting coin. With a mintage of just over a million (1,020,592 to be exact), the coin isn't one of the lowest mintage issues of the series.

However, after the Spanish American war that same year, when the Spain ceded ownership of the Philippine Islands to the U.S., nearly all of the quarters from the San Francisco mint that year were exported to the Philippines as increased U.S. commerce began in earnest.

As a result, the coin is surprisingly rare in mint state. Even original XF and AU coins are a challenge to find. Most of the higher-grade examples are cleaned VF-AU pieces that were returned to the U.S. In addition, AG-VG coins are easily found, as many

were returned to the U.S. and entered circulation, and were used until they were worn out, like most other Barbers.

Oddly enough, of the few mint state coins available, most of them are quite nice, with MS64-66 representing perhaps half of them. The issue is normally found well struck. And many of the slabbed coins labelled MS60-62 are not mint state at all, but AU coins or even cleaned AUs, so "buying the coin and not the holder" is paramount in this case. The pricing guides simply don't reflect the coin's true rarity in mint state. Until recently, the coin listed for between \$300 and \$400 in MS60, and about \$900 in MS63. However, actual sales prices at auction were far higher, and prices have recently moved upward. David Lawrence called this the best kept secret in the Barber Quarter series!
