And good news – the April NH Coin Expo in Manchester does not conflict with our meeting, so that's easy.



Coin in the Spotlight: 1870-S Half Dime

In 1978, a coin was brought to the Chicago office of RARCOA. It was taken into the back room and placed on a velvet pad for examination. The person said, "An 1870 half dime... so what?" To which was said, "Turn it over." There it was, an "S" mintmark. If you looked at the Red Book in 1978, you would not see anything listed for 1870-S. The coin was unknown. But now there was one.

It was authenticated using a scanning electron microscope (SEM) and a battery of other tests. 40 years after its discovery, it is unique – the only one known. And a lovely coin it is!

Like the unique 1870-S \$3 gold coin, this coin is assumed to be a duplicate of a coin placed in the cornerstone of the new San Francisco Mint (the "Granite Lady"). Other than the cornerstone coin itself, there is no record of mintage (like the \$3 and the 1870-S silver dollar, of which 9 are known).

The 1870-S half dime remains a most mysterious coin. Sold twice at auction as a choice AU55, the coin has been certified numerous times, crossing between NGC and PCGS multiple times, and has gradually been upgraded over the years. Despite there being some definite rub on the high points, the coin now resides in a PCGS MS64 holder! Of course, the grade inflation since certification began isn't the coin's fault! This coin is being displayed in Baltimore at the display table of the Liberty Seated Collectors Club from February 28 to March 2.
