Coin in the Spotlight: 1909-O Indian Half Eagle

The Indian \$5 gold coin minted in New Orleans is a most unusual coin. The 1909-O half eagle is the only coin of its type struck in this southern mint, and the first half eagle struck there since 1894. And it would be the last, as 1909 marked the last year of operations in New Orleans.

One of the two key dates of the series (the other being 1929), this coin is scarce in all grades, and rare in true mint state. The mintage was just 34,200 coins, making it the single-lowest mintage of the series (and lowest mintage of any half eagle since the 1894-O fifteen years earlier).

The average 1909-O grade is XF to AU50, and the coin gets pricey the closer one gets to uncirculated grades.



It is especially scarce because the mintmark is raised on this incuse coin, making it the single-highest point on the coin, and subject to immediate wear. A few of the well-worn 1909 pieces may be O-mint coins that are now unidentifiable.

Collectors also must be weary of 1909-D coins that have been altered into 1909-O.
