Coin in the Spotlight: 1854-O Liberty Seated Quarter, "Huge O"

One of the most popular varieties in the Liberty Seated quarter series is the "Huge O" of 1854-O.

All dies were made at the Philadelphia Mint, including the addition of mintmarks to the dies. However, in 1854, one of the quarter dies shipped to New Orleans lacked the mintmark entirely.

Rather than ship the die back to Philadelphia for correcting or replacement, someone in the Coiner's Department in New Orleans simply engraved (or more correctly crudely carved) the letter O into the die. When the carving was done, the area on the die containing the surrounding letters was damaged, particularly the QUARTER and **D**OLLAR.

The hand-carved mintmark is extremely thick, tall, and odd-shaped, entirely unlike the normal large O mintmark of the period. The mutant mintmark is so bold, that it is impossible to miss. However, since the normal mintmark is so large, sometimes a normal O is misattributed as the Huge O. This popular variety is scarce, but not rare.

This Fine+ example is worth \$1500-2000, compared to about \$45 for the normal Large O.
